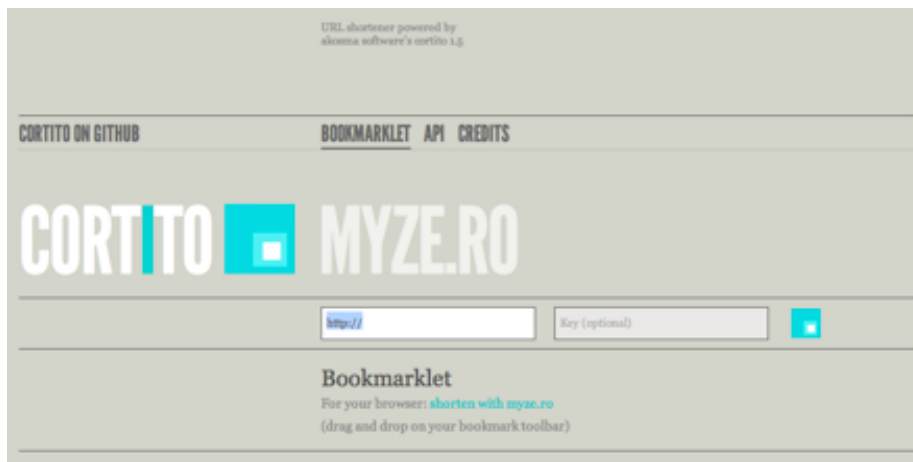


# A nicer cortito, courtesy of Zerofee
